

The FUSAG armies even created shoulder insignia patches for spying eyes to see. This is the insignia most commonly related to FUSAG. It is representative of the Operation name and its sub plan number that created FUSAG: Quicksilver I. However, pictured on the document are patches that were manufactured for the two army corps and 19 phony divisions that FUSAG simulated. The men of FUSAG had different uniforms with the different insignia they would wear to add to the deception that hundreds of thousands of troops were preparing for an invasion at Pas-de-Calais. They knew enemy eyes were watching and reporting what they thought they saw back to German command.


Description: Shoulder sleeve insignia of some nonexistent units of "FUSAG", part of Operation Fortitude in 1944
